Contrarily it has evolved under the vigilant eyes of a variety of personages, in particular Daw Anderson, Keeper of the Green during the 1850s, Old Tom Morris, greens keeper, golf teacher, club maker, ball maker and course designer, from during the 1860s to 1900. The course was directed by Dr Alister Mackenzie during the 1930s, a person whose designs are notable for their sensitivity to the nature of the original site (Source: Wikipedia.org).
