When the latest and best model is published, that club you had your eyes on now becomes overstocked inventory. It's possible to get it for a third off, or if you can wait two months, you can get it for up to 66% off.

If you do not mind used clubs, and while they're in good condition why would you, there are some absolute takes available. The cheapest place to get used clubs is at a yard sale. Real life story. I got a hardly used Callaway Gigantic Bertha II with head cover for \$10 at a yard sale. Why the low price? Because I purchased it from the better half. The hubby was out playing golf and left the sale to his spouse.

Yes this takes a little time but there are real diamonds in the rough to be found if you're employed at it. Test your local paper or online classifieds like Craig's list for times and locations.

Another trusty source for used clubs can be discovered online at the bigger club manufacturer and retail sites. Manufacturers will have "demo" clubs for sale and the retail sites often take trade-ins when they sell new clubs. These sites are sometimes a source of glorious buys and have the extra value of coming with customer service which of course the yard sale does not.

Don't thumb your nose at the gigantic box stores. You won't find top of the line clubs there but frequently time's you will find lower end clubs that are either unique ( like my \$40 Dunlop 9 wood from Target that I would not sell for \$400 ) or simply amazingly priced.

If you know precisely what you desire and you have got some patience, it's easy to get a heck of a deal on men's golfing clubs.

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
